SEEN AROUND THE STRAND

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There was puzzlement on Dec 8 when Lisa Andrews and Jeff Schindle found a **non-native snake** West of SR29. Mike Owen suspects the 8'2" roadkill is a green anaconda and will send it to Gainesville for identification.

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Mike watched a **river otter** crossing Janes' Scenic Drive to the east around Gate 12 on Nov 20. On the same day he saw a **Monarch butterfly** winging its way south over Janes' Scenic Drive about 4.2 miles north of Gate 1. Several weeks later, on Dec 15, a **bobcat** was seen by Dick Brewer on Jones Grade.

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A **Roseate Spoonbill** was seen on the top of a cypress tree about 60ft east of Janes' Drive by Dave Henley on Dec 2 and Mike Owen observed a **Red-tailed Hawk** in a cypress tree about 50 yards east of Janes' Drive on Dec 9. During the cold snap on Dec 12, Mike saw an **Eastern Phoebe** on the wire about 30 feet north of the Biology Office Trailer.

The **Friends of Fakahatchee State Preserve**, a 501(c)3 corporation, is the Citizen Support Organization of Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park, the largest cypress stand in the world and the deepest slough in the greater Everglades. Its 80,000 acres are bordered by I-75 (Alligator Alley), US-41 and SR-29. Its neighbor north of I-75 is the Florida Panther Refuge, with whom Friends may share associate membership.

HAVE YOU TAKEN THE PLUNGE YET?

If you haven't gotten wet in the Fakahatchee yet, what are you waiting for? There is no better way to experience the swamp than to get off the higher ground and join a swamp walk.

Taking the first step into the water is the most difficult. But then, as you realize that the bottom is sandy (not mucky) and the water is clean and clear (not murky) and the knowledgeable guides in front and in the rear will satisfy the gator's hunger way before it reaches you, you begin to relax and take in the beauty.

If you take your time and stay alert, you may be lucky enough to glimpse a limpkin snacking on an apple snail, or a fish-eating spider the size of your hand, or you may experience the delicate blossom of the clamshell orchid. But even if the swamp doesn't yield up any special surprises, you can always enjoy the layer upon layer of lush, tropical vegetation, the splatted octopus-looking tentacles of the mysterious wild orchids, and the simple serenity of being off the beaten path. It won't take very long at all before you develop the "Faka-habit" - the need to return time and again to this very special place.

If you've already participated in a swamp walk, come again and bring a guest. The more people that experience the Fakahatchee, the more friends we will have that will know the value of this treasure and will work to preserve it.

Notes about Swamp Walks

There will be four swamp walks each month this season through March, weather permitting. John Elting and Bill Mesce will lead the walks on the first and third Tuesdays and second Saturdays; Mike Owen will lead walks on the third Saturday. Other walks for special interest groups can be arranged on request.

The walks are limited to 15 people and must be booked in advance. Phone the office at (239) 695-4593 and make sure your reservation is confirmed - don't just leave a message and assume you're on the list!

The cost is \$25 (\$15 to FOF members). The group leaves from the Park office on Janes' Scenic Drive at 10a.m. and will be out for five to six hours. Wear runners and long pants. Bring drinking water, lunch, sunscreen, bug repellent, camera, binoculars. You will probably get wet so it might help to have a towel and a change of shoes and pants in the car.

Fakahatchee Manager Ralph Smith to Talk about Black Seminoles

Be sure to attend our next Members' meeting on January 21st. The highlight of the evening will be a presentation given by Park Manager Ralph Smith who will share with us his vast knowledge of the Black Seminoles and will even be dressed in authentic Seminole costume. The event will be held at the Oyster House Restaurant in Everglades City (on SR-29 opposite Everglades National Park). *Arrive early for dinner (5:30 to 6:00 p.m.)* which you will order off the menu and pay for yourself. BOARDWALK NEWS

The boardwalk area is drying out but there has been a steady stream of visitors, mostly European, and interesting sightings of bobcat, deer and the eagles in their nest.
