He has submitted plans for the new Visitor Center to the State and is preparing for the new trailer that will serve as the manager's residence but also has enough space for meetings.

Janes Scenic Drive is mostly under water after a very wet rainy season. When it dries out, he hopes to improve its condition so that it will be easier to maintain. Visitors who do not want a very wet and bumpy ride should go to Jones Grade which has been cleared to Pennington Post and beyond to Picayune Strand, thanks to the efforts of Jim & Niki Woodard and their team of volunteers.

Finally, over 50 miles of fire lines on the west side of the Preserve were cleared last spring and Dennis looks forward to an active burn season. Three of the Friends have been certified to take part, having passed a 3-day course. If you are interested in helping with burns, contact Dennis to find out when the next class will be held.

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Letter from the FOF President

Just a note to all of you hoping that you are having an enjoyable summer and, where appropriate, a profitable one. Having just completed my annual letter to Michael Bullock, head of the Florida Parks Department outlining FOF's accomplishments, challenges, and plans for the coming season together with my assessment of improved park management, I thought I would bring you up to date on developments.

The Park has now received the boom mower we purchased and is in the process of working Janes' Scenic Drive. Later in the fall, when the major trams are cleared of obstacles, it will be applied there also (hopefully no hurricanes to complicate the process).

The road crew that had been working State Road 29, and afforded sanctuary in the Fakahatchee, was contracted to upgrade and improve Janes' Scenic Drive. Despite explicit instructions on procedure, they apparently made a mess of it. Dennis is working with the District to resolve the problem but the bottom line is that the Park does not have the equipment, time, or personnel to adequately maintain the road. The State will have to provide further resources for maintenance.

Dennis is presenting our plans for an extension of the visitor center to the District. Hopefully these plans will be approved and construction can begin in the fall

Schedules for swamp walks, flatwood walks, and canoe trips, will be completed in the next month. As plans now stand, we will be making further use of our swamp buggy outside of the strands for trips to the flatwoods and prairies. Those who would like to participate, either as interpretive guides or drivers, should contact me at (239) 395-3760.

On Saturday, November 15, we have scheduled a day to work exotics (Brazilian pepper, lantana, etc) on the west side of the Park north of gate #19. Volunteers would be much appreciated. Please contact Dennis at (239) 695-4593.

Gary Nederveld, 1941-2006

Gary Nederveld, a resident of Bonita Springs, Florida, and Grand Haven, Michigan, died in a mountain biking accident on September 2, 2006, while visiting his daughter in McCall, Idaho. Like many of the Friends of Fakahatchee Strand, Gary became an enthusiastic supporter of the group when he walked through the swamp with Mike Owen.



Gary liked to tell a story about one of those swamp walks. While preparing for his hike through the muck, Gary realized that he had forgotten his camera in Michigan. His wife, Kathy, suggested that he purchase a disposable camera at the drugstore on his way out to Fakahatchee Strand. Gary thought that this would do in a pinch, but being a bit of an equipment freak, he was disgruntled to find himself so modestly equipped. Insult was added to injury when he arrived at the site in his little blue BMW convertible to find a group of orchid enthusiasts, newspaper reporters, and professional photographers sporting bazooka-sized telephoto lenses. Sheepishly, Gary joined the group and snapped away as he walked through the swamp. Days later, Gary had to laugh when an article featuring the Preserve appeared in the Palm Beach Post (8/20/04): "Quiet, bespectacled Gary Nederveld" was the first among the laymen to spot the ghost orchid. He had a photo to prove it.

Gary's love of Southwest Florida's natural communities led him to found Calusa Kayaking Adventures. He was an ACA certified canoe and kayaking instructor and urged the Pelican Landing community in Bonita Springs to purchase kayaks and create a paddling club. He volunteered many hours teaching community residents to paddle. Always striving toward excellence, Gary completed two University of Florida Master Naturalist modules this past summer. His generosity, humor, and leadership abilities are well-known to his friends. He will be missed.
