M.O.ZONE - Seen Around the Strand

On 1/27/13, around 8:30AM, between Gate 15-Gate 16, Mike Cullinan, volunteer, observed for a half an hour, a **Barred Owl** plunge into the water off of the ditch off of Janes Scenic Drive (JSD), seemingly after prey then return to sitting and waiting on the edge of the water then back toward the water trying, though unsuccessfully, to scratch out prey from under a log, then back to just looking around the water's edge. At 12:15PM, Mike Cullinan observed a **Bobcat** about 0.25 miles north of Gate 1.

On 1/31/13, around 8:20AM, between 1.5 to 1.7 miles West of US-41/SR-29, Bente Torvund, Administrative Assistant, observed seventeen **White Pelicans** flying over US-41, as well as two **Roseate Spoonbills**, and two **Glossy Ibis** feeding in the marsh off of US-41. On 2/1/13, around 9AM, on the fence next to Park Headquarters, Mike Owen, Biologist, observed an **Eastern Phoebe** and later that morning, at the Ballard Cabin, on East Main, he observed two Belted **Kingfishers**, one **Anhinga**, two **American Crows**, four **White Ibis**, one **Great Egret** and one **Little Blue Heron**. Also over Ballard Pond, he observed approximately fifty **Tree Swallows** drinking from the surface of the Pond. On his return to the office, he observed a male **American Kestrel** near the beginning of the Drive.

On 2/4/13, around 9AM, Dee Leonard, volunteer, observed an adult, light brown **Everglades Mink** adult run to the west near K2. On 2/5/13, in the early evening, in the first two miles of JSD, Mike Owen heard a **Downy Woodpecker** and three **Red-bellied Woodpeckers** call and saw an **Eastern Phoebe** as well as a female **Northern Harrier**. On 2/6/13, at 10:40AM, prior to Gate 7, Steve Houseknecht, Park Services Specialist, observed a small adult dark brown **Everglades Mink** run across JSD from North to South. *See the note about mink on the page 3*.

On 2/7/13, at 4:35PM, Steve Houseknecht, observed two **Black Bears**, an adult and a cub, go to the east just after Gate 12, East Main. On 2/6/13, in the early evening, around Gate 7, West Main, Mike Owen heard two **Great Horned Owls** calling and on 2/14/13, while at Gate 19, he heard two **Barred Owls** calling.

On 2/17/13, around 10:22AM, Steve Houseknecht, observed a **Short-tailed Hawk** (black morph) flying over the Shop Area. On 2/19/13, around 2:45PM, Renee Rau, Park Manager, and Bente Torvund observed an adult **Bald Eagle** soaring low over Headquarters. On 2/23/13, at 9:36AM, George Wilder, visitor observed a **Green Anole** on the south steps of the Administration building.


On 2/24/13, Karen Relish, OPS Ranger, observed a **Red-shouldered Hawk** flying and carrying a **Black Racer** over Firetower Pond to the West. On 2/24/13, at 8-8:15AM, over Dan House Prairie, Bente Torvund, observed two perched **Orange-crowned Warblers** along with a male **Northern Parula** in Oak trees, and two perched **Savannah Sparrows** in Florida Bully trees, as well as one **Grasshopper Sparrow** close to the ground (see photo below).


Who Saw the Everglades Mink?

President's Message

Well, we're up to our ears in people wanting a life experience in "The Everglades". Sometimes we call them tourists, but I think they're deeper than that. At any rate, everyone is busy with new Tram Tours on Janes Scenic Drive, Boat Tours to Fakahatchee Island, being docents at Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk, taking visitor surveys and manning the new visitor office at Park Headquarters.

We had a good picnic in Copeland Saturday. We had lots of fun meeting each other and talking about the Park. There was a call for all volunteers to think about who you want to "play" with and starting asking your friends to join you volunteering in the Park. We can see that next year will require twice as many volunteers as we have now, so start recruiting. Contact Marya or me if you want to get plugged in.

What have we accomplished? This year we've helped fund the most comprehensive and successful prescribed burn program in Park history; burning for the first time several thousand acres in the west part of the park. We've repaired lots of essential equipment including a heavy pickup truck and swamp buggy that get used all the time. We had great success with our first an annual appeal letter & wish list which generated over \$8,000 in direct park support. We added a Tram Tour on Janes Scenic Drive. We conducted an organizational audit and are in the midst of an internal assessment to prepare us for the major undertaking of improvements at the Fakahatchee Boardwalk at Big Cypress but not least, we've just acquired membership/donor management software that lays the foundation to grow our membership and develop donors.

The coming year is challenging the Board to organize more efficiently. We'll be starting a Board assessment & training program, we'll review our bylaws, we'll reorganize the committee structure, and we'll develop a budget that can serve as an effective management tool. We're looking at offering additional visitor experiences and developing the Visitor Center at park headquarters where we can offer a broader line of merchandise. Most important, in 2013-14 we'll provide the highest level of park support in the history of our organization.

I invite you to be part of the fun. Come see what we have to offer, volunteer, or just keep supporting in the ways you can. From the Board of Directors, from park staff, and from all the volunteers, thanks for your support.

BOARDWALK REPORT

Ahhhhh, it seems that spring is in the air ...

Our young (1-year and 2-year-old) **Alligators** and their mother seem to be slowly moving down the borrow canal and can now usually be seen from the opening across from the corner of the Indian Village fence mostly in the afternoon. You must often look for them through the vegetation.

Our young **Bald Eaglet** is growing – no longer looking like a ball of fluff but nearly the size of his/her parents! He is now flapping his/her wings. One visitor sent this great photo along to share with you.

From the behavior it appears that there may also be young **Osprey**(s) in the Osprey nest. The nest can be viewed from that short jog in the railing near the Pond Apple Sign.

A couple of visitors excitedly shared with me that they had watched the mating of a pair of **Red Shouldered Hawks**.

Always a favorite place for birders, this month they have been reporting these sightings: Black & White Warbler, Prairie Warbler, Yellow Throated Warbler, Common Yellow Throat, Tufted Titmouse, Blue-Grey Gnatcatcher, Red Bellied Woodpecker, Black-Crowned Night Heron.

Small details are as interesting as the larger ones, such as, **Zebra Longwing** and **Ruddy Daggerwing Butterflies**, tiny **Green Tree Frogs** on fern stems, **Anoles**, **Turtles** and small **Fish**.

Fascinated by the spider webs I often see while walking along the boardwalk, one day there was a **Silk Spider** vertically suspended in what looked like mid-air overhead near the Sword Fern Sign. He was, of course, in the middle of a finely woven, delicately looking, beautifully symmetrical vertical web secured by the trees on *both* sides of the Boardwalk. Almost immediately one visitor stopped to see what had caught my attention and in short order we had a crowd of visitors admiring and photographing this amazing and beautiful feat of construction.

The **Royal Palm**, listed on the endangered native plant list, is native to south Florida. One day each year for the past several years Boardwalk volunteers along with Mike Owen, the Park Biologist, have been taking a survey of these magnificent trees. Each tree has been given its own identification number and then the height, the distance from the Boardwalk and the health of the palm is recorded. The number of these trees which can be seen from our Boardwalk have steadily increased over the years. In 2004 69 were recorded, the number increased to 87 in 2006 and this year the number has risen to 104! Only by keeping this data do we know that our population of these trees is growing.

What Are We? Who Are We?

The **Friends of Fakahatchee, Inc,** a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit corporation <u>Citizen Support Organization</u>, provides financial and volunteer support to preserve the unique ecology and cultural heritage of Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park and to educate the public about its importance. The Fakahatchee is the largest cypress strand in the world and the deepest slough in the greater Everglades. Its 80,000 acres are bordered by I-75 (Alligator Alley), US-41 (Tamiami Trail), SR-29, Fakahatchee Bay, and Picayune State Forest.

The Ghost Writer, named after the endangered Ghost Orchid which blooms in the Preserve, is edited by Marya Repko with contributions from members and friends. It is issued at least six times a year and has an average circulation of over 300 copies.

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
