M.O.ZONE - Seen Around the Strand


On 3/28/10, in mid-afternoon, Fred Sanvino, volunteer, observed a **Swallow-tailed Kite** flying along with a vulture over Lake Gloria in Copeland. On 3/28/10, around 2:30PM, Dennis Giardina, FWS Biologist, and Mike Owen, Park Biologist, observed an **Indigo Bunting** flying down East Main. On 3/29/10, Barb Sanvino, volunteer, also saw a **Swallow-tailed Kite** flying over Lake Gloria. On 3/31/10, in the mid afternoon, Terrance Craig, Park Ranger, was alerted about a approximately 2 foot injured **Greater Siren** (an eel-like salamander) on Janes Scenic Drive (JSD). On 3/31/10, around 11AM, the **Everglades Mink** that had the injured eye and taken to The Conservancy for rehabilitation was released back into Fakahatchee.

On 4/1/10 and again on 4/4/10 Fred Sanvino and on the later both he and Steve Houseknecht, Park Service Specialist, observed a **Swallow-tailed Kite** flying solo over Lake Gloria. On 4/2/10, around 8AM, **Alicia Campanella**, observed 3 **Black-necked Stilts** in flight going east over SR-29 near the intersection of SR-29 and US-41. On 4/4/10, in the early morning, Tony Marx and Malee Earle, visitors, observed an adult **black bear** at the end of JSD near the filled in Prairie Canal. Off the drive, they also heard two **American Alligators** bellowing 5-6 times in succession. On 4/5/10, around 10 AM, Mike Owen and David Shindle, Biologist from The Conservancy, observed a **Red Shouldered Hawk** trying to carry a dead marsh rabbit from the beginning of JSD away from 15 Black Vultures.

On 4/9/10, in the early afternoon, Donna Glann-Smyth, volunteer, and Vince Lamb, visitor, observed a three foot long **cottonmouth** on JSD. On 4/11/10, Alayna and Jay Galbraith, frequent birders to the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk, reported seeing a **Black-throated Green Warbler**, **Black and White Warbler**, **Carolina Wren**, **Great-crested Flycatcher**, **Northern Parula**, **Pileated Woodpecker**, **Red-Bellied Woodpecker**, and a **Swallow-tailed kite**. On 4/12/10, around 3:30PM, Ralph and Wyvette Chafin, visitors, and Karen Relish, Park Ranger, and Richard Fagan, volunteer, stopped and helped a **soft shell turtle** with a 15 inch carapace cross from South to North on US-41, possibly on the move because April is soft shell turtle nesting season per Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Be careful; soft shell turtles have a very long neck can bite hard and claw.

On 4/15/10 Mike Cullininan, visitor, observed a 9-10 inch **Ringneck snake** with an orange neck ring on the East Main tram as well as fresh **panther tracks**. On 4/26/10, Scott Randolph, OPS Ranger, and Connie Randolph, volunteer, observed a **Barred Owl** sitting on a power line off of JSD just north of Park Headquarters. On 4/27/10, in the morning, from the beginning of the drive to about Gate 7/West Main, Ron Kotliar, volunteer, observed an adult **Florida Snapping Turtle**, **Striped Mud turtle** with a 3.5 foot carapace, a **crayfish** and a 3.5 foot long juvenile **American Alligator**. On 5/1/10, in the morning, Karen Relish observed a total of 8 **Mottled Ducks** in the marsh on the south side of US-41 between the boardwalk and intersection of SR-29/US 41.

Felina's New Home; A Florida Panther Story

When Marya asked me to review the children's book *Felina's New Home, A Florida Panther Story,* written by Loran Wlodarski and illustrated by Lew Clayton, I said, "sure." I mean, who could say no

to her, but I really didn't feel qualified. I was thinking that a youngster would be a much better book reviewer than me. Be that as it may, I did read *Felina's New Home* and these are my thoughts:

I liked Felina and I was bummed out that human beings were wrecking her old home. I also liked that Felina was very sociable, having amiable, if not depressing conversations with red-cockaded woodpeckers, gopher tortoises and manatees but when she was talking to the American crocodile, I wanted to say "No! Felina, No!" As if it weren't bad enough for Felina and her neighbors, dealing with pollution, roads, cars and unruly ATV riders, one day a man (that looked suspiciously like to Roy McBride), popped up and shot her with a tranquilizer dart and Felina's world faded to black.

The underlying theme of the book is familiar; the human beings are out of control and the other species of the planet are suffering because of them. However, the book also reflects that some of the human beings care and are trying to do something about it. Those are the human beings that I want to know. I want to be friends with them and help them help Felina and her friends. I hope the budding biologists of tomorrow who read *Felina's New Home* will feel the same way. The back of the book contains fun facts for creative minds and a lot of other good information. The book was beautifully illustrated and the drawings of the other rare and endangered species that share Felina's home with her were very well done.

Although it's been a while since I've read a book like this and don't currently have a seven-year-old to read it to, *Felina's New Home* brought out the kid in me and that kid wants Felina to have a happy new home.

MAJOR FOF ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2009-2010

The Florida Park Service prepared preliminary sketches of new routes for the Boardwalk and design ideas for the proposed Visitor Center based on FOF CSO Goals #1 & #2.

The Partnership in Parks (PIP) Grant has been submitted with the FOF portion of \$100,000 reserved in the bank requesting the Park Service match of \$66,667.

There were two new Interpretative programs initiated this season: Fakahatchee Coastal Cruise and The SAFARI. Both were successful in introducing new people to the Park and raising funds.

There were five major articles in South Florida newspapers including the winning photograph of the Ghost Orchid by Board member Jay Staton. These articles were instrumental in bring many new Visitors to the Boardwalk this year. That, with the new Iron Ranger, has resulted in record donations to the FOF.

Additional Swamp Walks were scheduled this season on Saturdays and on one Tuesday. Leader P J Marinelli joined John Elting and Bill Mesce to enable the extra schedule.

The Boardwalk had regular twice-monthly maintenance sessions. Boardwalk Naturalists Caryl and Nelson Tilden were joined this year by Kathy Hatch to assist in guiding our visitors.

The Friends contributed funding for exhibits in the new Big Cypress Visitor Center.

Our promotional DVD "Window to the Fakahatchee" was completed to use in fundraising for our Boardwalk and Visitor Center.

The use of PayPal for the ease of our Guests in paying for events and membership was installed.

Accounting software was purchased to make our growth more manageable. It will be used starting in the new fiscal year.

CSO GOALS 2010-2011

- 1. Define the FOF requirements for the expanded Boardwalk and the Visitor Center
- 2. Meet with Florida Park System planners to develop a "request for proposal" to select a Design firm and start the permitting process
- 3. Identify, interview, and select a Fund Raising firm to lead our campaign
- 4. Identify, interview, and select a Grant Writer to search for funding
- 5. Increase our Interpretation and Fund Raising with additional Events
- 6. Construct a pad for a portable toilet and picnic table at the East River canoe launch site
- 7. Provide funding to renovate the Harmon Building for Park offices and FOF meetings
- 8. Clear the East Main trail from Ballard Camp to Jones Grade
- 9. Provide resources for Burn support and Exotic Species removal

Cigar Orchid Restoration Project Update by Dennis Giardina

On April 22 and 23, about a dozen of Fakahatchee's few remaining cigar orchids were visited by a group led by Mike Owen, Park Biologist, and Matt Richards from Atlanta Botanical Garden to collect the seed pods from the crosspollination effort that was undertaken last year and to pollinate the huge new cigar orchid we found last summer.

On behalf of all the collaborators, I would like to thank the Friends of Fakahatchee for financially supporting the cigar orchid restoration project.
