M.O.ZONE - Seen Around the Strand

On 1/5/09, in the late morning, Renee Rau, Park Manager, Alicia Mumford, Park Ranger, and Laura Skinner, AmeriCorps member, saw a female **Snail Kite** over Dan House Prairie. On 1/6/09, Mike Owen, Biologist, saw a Coopers Hawk over the Park Headquarters. On 1/7/09, Alicia Mumford saw a **Big Cypress Fox squirrel**. On 1/12/09, Steve Houseknecht, Park Services Specialist, saw a **striped crayfish snake** and a **yellow rat snake** just east of the Prairie Canal. He also saw a **Bobcat** near Gate 16.

On 1/12/09, Chris Becker, District IV Biologist, Steve Houseknecht and Terrance Craig, Park Ranger, saw a dead **Sharp-shinned Hawk** near Prairie Canal. On 1/12/09, Laura Skinner noted the first instars of the **lubber grasshoppers** for the 2009 season on the railings of the park bathrooms. On 1/6/09, Richard Fagan, volunteer, saw 2 **Red-shouldered hawks** mating at the top of a Cypress, 2.5 miles north of the Park office, off of Janes Scenic Drive (JSD). On 1/11/09, Richard Fagan observed a female **Sharp-shinned Hawk** over Janes Scenic Drive dive into the east ditch then into a tree. He also saw one later flying over the G12 Parking area. On 1/12/09, in the early afternoon, Dave Moore, FPP, saw a 5.5 foot long **Eastern diamondback rattlesnake** just north of the Park headquarters.

On 1/16/09, near the shop, Virgil and Joanna Allmond, volunteers, observed a **Florida Chicken turtle** deposit 6-8 eggs in a nest cavity. The turtle took almost one and a half hours to dig this nest and deposit and cover its eggs. On 1/19/09, Ron Kotliar, volunteer, and Richard Fagan saw 1,000 **Tree swallows**, a **Florida Chicken turtle** and a **Florida Snapping turtle** along Janes Scenic Drive. On 1/22/09, Mike Owen and Laura Skinner saw a **Summer Tanager** flying to a prairie hammock east of JSD about one mile north of the Fire tower.

On 1/27/09, in the afternoon, Renee Rau, one **Eastern Mud Snake** was seen southeast part of Preserve. On 2/2/09, in the morning, Renee Rau and Steve Houseknecht saw 40 **White pelicans** circling overhead over US-41 near the East River Roost.

From Savannah's Eyes


It was so nice outside this past weekend. We took a drive down "Janes Scenic Drive" in

FUZZY WUZZY DECLINE

Tillandsia pruinosa (fuzzy wuzzy air plant) numbers have declined from last year. Elaine and I conducted a population count on January 7, 2009, in the Fakahatchee Strand and found 34 of these plants along an approximate 1000 meter section of the tram we have surveyed over the past four years. Twenty six of these plants were located on the south side and only eight on the north side of the tram. There is significant decrease of the plants on the north side.

Comparisons over the past four years:

There was a total of eight plants blooming; five on south and three on north side. Average height above ground on south was 2.50 meters and on north side 4.03 meters.

Hurricane Wilma in 2005 and subsequent vegetation changes and sunlight exposure may have been a factor in the population shifts on the north side plants which face south. It will be interesting to see what 2010 provides.

All that were invited knew that they would be receiving a first person view of the Fak the following day.



BOARDWALK REPORT

If you have visited the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk this month you have seen more wading birds than have been visible during the past few winters. On a given day visitors have seen many mature and immature ibises, green herons, great blue herons, mature and immature black-crowned night herons, great egrets, wood storks and others. We are excited to report that two eagle chicks have been seen and photographed on the nest. For about two weeks only one chick had been observed. They would be about a month old now and are growing rapidly. For the first time in a couple of years a red shouldered hawk chick has been observed in the nest near the twin bald cypress trees. Twice during February a mother black bear and cub appeared near the end of the boardwalk and remained for several minutes while many visitors took pictures and enjoyed the sight.

Barred owls are heard regularly along the boardwalk, but rarely observed. What has been seen more frequently this winter is a great horned owl which often sits on the same limb in a tree about 100 yards west of the boardwalk. Experienced birder, Alan Murray, has been generous with his expertise and spotting scope. He has shown many visitors the great horned owl (and other birds) they would have otherwise missed. We appreciate his willingness to share.

Repairs have been carried out each Tuesday by a small crew of volunteers. Bud Scott, Dick Hughes, Jim Wink, Jerry Winters and I have replaced a number of deck boards, support stringers, and railings, many of which date back to 1981 when the last major renovation of the boardwalk was carried out. Jim Wink, Jerry Winters and Signe Backus swept the length of the boardwalk which was showing the effects of the annual dropping of leaves and bald cypress needles. We appreciate that Park Manager Renee Rau has given high priority to boardwalk repairs. Ranger Terrance Craig has been very helpful transporting new wood to the boardwalk and removing the "dead" wood.

The water level at the gator pond continues to drop and the wading birds are enjoying the concentration of food.

If you have not taken the opportunity to visit the boardwalk this winter, we invite you to do so soon.
