We are working on events for the winter season. The attached calendar is a *draft* and might change as we firm up dates. Check our website for the latest news.

M.O.ZONE - Seen Around the Strand

On 5/1/09 and 5/11/09 in the p.m. Richard Fagan, volunteer, saw 60 **swallow-tail kites** off of both north and south sides of US-41 and just west of SR-29. On 5/16/09 Joseph Campanella, volunteer, saw a large Florida **black bear** drinking from a puddle on Janes Scenic Drive near Gate 7 (West Main).

On 6/1/09 Steve Houseknecht, Park Services Specialist, and Jill Waisley saw an adult healthy **River Otter** run from the Park Headquarters area into the Cypress to the South. On 6/9/09 Terrance Craig, Park Ranger, observed a 1.5-foot **cotton mouth** near Gate 2. On 6/13/09 Rick Cruz, volunteer, and Julie Cardenas saw a **bobcat** on JSD at Gate 12 area as well as 2 **bears**, a female and 1 cub, around K2. On 6/22/09 Steve Houseknecht saw a 10-inch long **Diamondback rattlesnake** along Prairie Canal. On 6/29/09 Ron Kotliar, volunteer, observed a **coyote** on US-41 near Bridge 57.

In late June and early July of 2009, Steve Houseknecht saw a **King Rail** off of JSD in the prairies and south of a Cypress Stand. On 7/1/09 Steve Houseknecht and Laura Skinner, Americorps member, saw a **black bear** on JSD between Gate 1 and Gate 7. On 7/7/09 in the late afternoon, Mike Owen, Park Biologist, identified a **striped crayfish snake** on JSD for some visitors. On 7/18/09 Renee Rau, Park Manager, and Rick Cruz observed approximately 4-foot **Diamondback rattlesnake** off of US-41 near the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk.

On 8/3/09 in the afternoon Alicia Mumford, Park Ranger, observed a **Florida Panther** with a raccoon in its mouth off JSD approximately 2 miles from Gate 1. On 8/6/09 Laura Skinner observed a collared **Florida Panther** around Gate 18. On 9/2/09 Terrance Craig saw a **black bear** near Gate 7.

On 9/4/09 on a botanical expedition, Mike Owen, George Wilder, Botanist at Naples Botanical Gardens, and his assistant Jean Roche observed a **Great White heron**, a **King rail**, two **Limpkins**, and three **Eastern king birds** on their drive down JSD. On 9/13/09 Tom McDaniel, member of the Florida Trail Association, observed two **Florida panther kittens** about 20-30 pounds run down JSD drive near Gate 7 (see page 3). On 9/17/09 Mike Owen and Karen Relish, OPS Ranger, saw a **Black-throated Blue Warbler** eating insects in trees over East Main Tram near the cabin. On 9/24/09 on JSD Mike Owen and Alicia Mumford saw 2 **loggerhead shrikes**, 2 **mocking birds**, and 2 **hummingbirds** (near a firebush).

Mike told the *Ghost Writer* that the number of **Diamondback rattlesnakes** sighted in the Fakahatchee in 2008 and 2009 (at least 1 per month) is much greater than in previous years when they were rare. There is no apparent reason for this increase. He also said that **Burmese Pythons** have not been reported since 2007 but they are often hard to spot when they are curled up.



NEW DVD

FOF director and volunteer Jay Staton has produced a labor of love, a DVD showing the flora and fauna of the Fakahatchee. Some of the images were taken by motion-sensitive cameras that he placed strategically in the park to capture panthers, deer, and bears who would otherwise shy away from a human trying to take photos.



One Fakahatchee aficionado said it was "total emersion" and appreciated that most of the sound was natural (birds, water) rather than someone talking at her. A local swamp tromper told me she'd never seen some of the things so close up and recommended the DVD highly. A former resident emailed "It is such a wonderful DVD ... I will enjoy giving them as gifts."

A Fakahatchee First! COASTAL CRUISE



CSO Meeting Report

Fakahatchee was well-represented at the Florida Park Service meetings in Orlando at the end of September. Renee Rau attended the managers' meeting while Tom Maish and Dennis Giardina represented FOF at sessions for CSOs (Citizens' Support Organizations).

In fact, Fakahatchee made quite a hit with the new display panel designed by Glen Stacell and a laptop running Jay Staton's "Fak-a-habit" DVD. We were the only park to have a table set up and "were the envy of all the other CSOs" according to Tom Maish.

Good news from discussions at the meetings is that the Park Service is in favor of our plans to rebuild the Boardwalk and add a Visitors' Center. We were encouraged to submit a Partnership-in-Parks grant request.

Some of the topics of conversation among CSOs were social networking websites (Flickr, Facebook) and the use of PayPal which FOF is currently considering for membership and merchandise sales on its website.

All in all, according to Tom, "it was a quite interesting, valuable and worth the trip."

PANTHER SIGHTING

On Sunday afternoon, September 19, at about 1:45 PM, I was driving slowly south-bound on Jane's Scenic Drive between Gates 7 and 9, when two young panther cubs ran out onto the road from the west side. The two cubs were playing, with one chasing the other as they darted into the road about 100 feet ahead of me. They ran up the road ahead of me about 30-40 feet before seeing me and running back into the bush. I stopped the car where they went into the bush and there were ripples in the water where they ran or swam away. I turn off the car engine and listened and heard one of the cubs calling for its mother. I also heard a slow plopping of something walking through the water nearby, maybe the mother?

They were beyond the kitten stage and had long gangly legs which seemed to be too long for their body. They were definitely young panthers with long thick tails and big feet. The event happened so quickly that , I didn't get any photos.

After visiting the FAK for over 12 years, I have never even seen a Panther much less two Panther cubs. The Fakahatchee is an amazing place.
