A Retrospective on Four Years as President

One of my favorite quotes is "When the student is ready the teacher will appear."

I was introduced to the Fakahatchee Preserve by a friend from upstate New York who shamed me for living here and not knowing about the Fakahatchee. An avid birder and explorer, he gave me my first visit to the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk and numerous rides down Janes Scenic Dr. — to this day I credit and blame him for what was to become six years of feverish commitment to support the Friends of Fakahatchee (FOF) mission.

I watched the FOF from a distance, went to the Safari; eventually at an FOF dinner I decided this was the kind of group I could connect with —

no fancy gowns and high heel, no suits and ties — just what I was looking for. I signed up my membership with Marya Repko at Port of the Isle dinner.

Soon after, it was election time for Board members, and I nominated myself. At the FOF picnic Allan and Elsie Caldwell gave me the warmest welcome; I didn't know a soul and it made a big impression on me.

In April 2011, when Tom Maish was ending his President term on the Board and Howard Lubel was elected president, I volunteered to be Secretary, not knowing a thing about a CSO and having never served on a Board. I figured my 25 years of experience in training and managing should be of some help.

Fast forward to April 2017, I still consider myself "the student." Because I have a curious mind and want to understand how things work, I often take on a lot of responsibilities just to learn the ropes, and assess the situation so I can be in a position to help make progress in collaboration with the people that surround me.

A sample of six years of collaborative progress looks like this:

- It all begins with pursuit of a better understanding of the FOF Mission, its role as a CSO, and the Park's Unit Management Plan. Education begins with the Board.
- In 2012, the Board approves launch of an Annual fundraiser earmarked for Direct Park Support. The fundraiser has generated nearly \$50,107 to date, thanks to the generosity of our members.
- In 2013, FOF borrows a tram from Lovers Key to determine if tram tours guided by FOF naturalists are feasible. The tours program is established with the Park Manager, resulting in \$108,678 to date in tour sales. Efforts to address the FOF mission to educate the public about the Preserve increase significantly.
- Development of a comprehensive budget, with a 60% budget increase for Direct Park support.
- FOF provides fiscal support for the Orchid restoration project with \$5,880.00 to date.

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- Several grants are received, totaling a little over \$50.000.00.
- Acquired a better understanding of the Oil Well Road Trust Fund, received \$17,495 to date for the management of the OWR parcel.
- Increased support for the Volunteers in the field; better equipment and vehicles keep them safe and show appreciation for their efforts.
- Host Volunteer Appreciation picnics to recognize the average of 10,000 volunteer hours yearly from volunteers who drive to the Park from Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Naples, North Fort Myers, as well as our resident volunteers.
- Support a "Tour de force" by the Boardwalk Vision committee:
- Deceleration lane completed at the new Parking site
- Secure approval from Donald Forgione, State Parks Director, to build the Education Pavilion on the other side of the canal instead of next to the Parking lot.
- · Creation of a Master Interpretation Plan for the new Boardwalk experience
- \$150,000 generated for Architects, Surveys, and sign interpretations.
- Created our beautiful www.orchidswamp.org website that was cited as one the best CSO Website at the Annual CSO convention in Orlando.

The list goes on. Since 2012 the FOF has recorded nearly \$180,000.00 in Direct Park support; this was achievable through the collaboration of the Directors on the Board who kept their focus on the Mission of the CSO.

I am particularly happy that we were able to improve our relationship with (then) State Parks Director Donald Forgione. There is no doubt in my mind that the weekend he spent at my request with the Board, Park staff, and the fellowship at the picnic in the Fakahatchee in Dec 2014, facilitated the progress of the Boardwalk Expansion project and improved communications between Florida State Parks District 4 and FOF as we continued to move the project along.

As I end my six year term, and an unprecedented four years as president, apparently I should be relieved. But because it has been a most gratifying six years, I leave with pride of accomplishment, mostly proud of all the Board members and volunteers who served the FOF by my side, and extremely grateful for the generosity of time from our volunteers, as well as the generosity of all our members and donors.

Very best success to the new Officers and Board members and congratulations to elected President Patrick Higgins; his leadership will continue to elevate the Mission of the FOF as the forecast for the years ahead brings many projects finally to fruition. Patrick's contagious positive "can do" attitude combined with impressive communication skills provides a leadership essential at this point in time when the organization is embarking on the execution phase of important projects that have been on the drawing table. I look forward to supporting the Board in a different capacity and wish them the same rewarding experience serving the Friends of Fakahatchee brought to me.

Annual Dinner Celebrates Service to the Fakahatchee

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2017 Mel Finn award Continued... Dino is a long time member of the FOF and has served as Treasurer and on our Board of Directors. He has also participated in scientific research surveys to document the park's botanical diversity, as well as to locate exotic and invasive species. Throughout the year Dino works to eliminate the invasive plants Brazilian pepper and caesar weed from the park.

Dino has worked as a volunteer on FOF swamp walks guided by Bill Mesce. He also has guided walks of his own as a treat for our trail maintenance volunteers. He has participated in, or was a leader on, all major FOF trail clearing endeavors including the opening of both the East and South Main Trams. He has cleared miles of trails in the remote northwest section of the park so that exotic control teams could gain access. He has worked at the East River and Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk to improve visitors' experience.

Dino founded Fearless Fak-a-Hackers and has served as "Fearless Leader" since its inception. Even in the most climatically inhospitable times of the year, he's often working in remote and difficult terrain. He has led the "Hackers" clearing trails and building bridges over washouts so that the park's visitors have the safe access they need.

In addition to his seemingly tireless trail work, Dino Barone offers public outreach, education and visitor services every day he is in the park, so that visitors are able to learn, to understand, and to support the Fakahatchee, as did Mel Finn. Congratulations, Dino!

The annual Friends of Fakahatchee volunteer appreciation picnic was held on March 18. More than 50 FOF volunteers gathered on the shores of Lake Harmon for a meal of barbecued burgers and sausage. "We couldn't run this park without you," Subic said. "The 10,000 volunteer hours you donated last year are the equivalent of six full time employees in a park that has a full time staff of five."

Our tour program from November through April generated approximately \$24,400. This is not quite as high as last season because we had to cancel our combined tram tour/wet walks and swampwalks a month early this year due to the lack of water. The latter are our most lucrative programs.

We may also have been hit slightly by a commercial operator's pop-up ad that appears next to Fakahatchee's reviews on TripAdvisor. They seem to be cashing in on FOF's rave reviews. The ad redirects visitors to an unrelated commercial tour site, possibly skimming some of our potential attendees.

While we may have fallen short on tour numbers, we certainly made up on new member recruitment. Tours are not only an important revenue source but also help fulfill our mission of educating the public about the unique ecology and cultural heritage of the park.

FOF forges links with The Naples Garden Club and benefits from a major grant

FOF's Francine Stevens and Patrick Higgins attended Naples Garden Club's April 3rd meeting where they received a \$13,000 grant from the Club's President, Sandy Lasch. The Naples Garden Club awarded some \$80,000 of grants this year, and FOF was fortunate to receive one of the largest.



The grant is to build a 14 x 20 ft Chickee structure in the clearing at the base of our Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk. It will serve as an outdoor classroom and rain shelter and will be able to accommodate up to twenty on flexible seating. The grant also covers the provision of two custom interpretive panels at the site. The Chickee will be the focus of some new educational program offerings next season.

We have received tremendous support from the Naples Garden Club this year. In February the Club booked two private tram tours on Janes Scenic Drive for their members. Each was at full capacity. The participants were great sports, and in nicely tailored trousers and Gucci shoes they spontaneously took advantage of the early dry-down to penetrate a few hundred feet into Six Pipe Slough. One of the groups was greeted by a cottonmouth right where they stepped off the tram! Undaunted, their members are already arranging a proper swamp walk for November.

Nature's Clean-up Crew

We often get asked, "What are those big black birds?" They are nature's clean-up crew, helping to eliminate toxic bacteria and diseases from dead animals. If you look closely you will see 2 different kinds: the red-headed Turkey Vulture and the more wrinkled black-headed, Black Vulture.

The two help each other. Turkey Vultures have a highly developed sense of smell and can locate food from high above. They are the first to arrive. The Black Vultures are what you often see soaring near a Turkey Vulture, waiting for them to locate food. Once food is found the Black Vultures are usually first to eat as they have stronger jaws.
