

### **President and Executive Director's Letter**



Henry Ford said "Coming together is a beginning; keeping together is progress; working together is success."

Henry Ford has nothing to do with our Friends organization, but his quote rings true to the success of the *Five Faces of Fakahatchee* fundraiser at Paul Arsenault's Gallery on January 16. Even under the capable leadership of Tom Maish, Chair of the Boardwalk Expansion Project, it took several months of collective effort to plan the event.

We first want to thank Paul and Eileen Arsenault for their generous offer to facilitate the fundraiser at their Banyan Gallery. Of course we thank Paul for painting five original oil

paintings, all created while he was knee deep in the Fakahatchee. Paul titled one painting "Boardwalk Reflection" and it was auctioned off at the event with 100% of the auction price donated to the Friends (shown at right). The four other paintings are on sale for a couple more weeks and 40% will be donated to the Friends.

Director of Florida State Parks Eric Draper came down from Tallahassee to personally help the Friends honor Lavern Gaynor Norris, who was the focus of our attention for the evening. It was Board Director Andrew Tyler's excellent PowerPoint presentation, a result of hours of research, who drove the point home that it was Lavern's father, Lester Norris who saved a tract of land from logging, a tract of land we know to be the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk. Without his quick action there would not be a Boardwalk - visited by over 80,000 people annually - a Boardwalk now destined for bigger things with the upcoming Boardwalk Expansion project.

We owe a very special thank you to Ray Carroll, who auctioned off a weekend at his Fakahatchee camp. His generosity, combined with Paul's painting, the donation from the Dellora Norris Foundation, and donations from everyone who attended the Gala, allowed us to raise nearly \$20,000.00!



We close this letter by thanking Nicole Gordon, Vice President Business Development Officer at First Florida Integrity Bank for sponsoring the event, FOF Vice President John Kaiser and his wife Polly for funding the beverages and serving seventy guests visiting the bar, and lastly a thank you to Photographers Jay Staton and Rita Bauer for all the beautiful pictures we know you will enjoy.

Off we go to the Bald Eagle nest! Sure enough, one adult was out on a tree branch and the other was silhouetted through the tree leaves. Very nice indeed.

There were lots of bird sounds, but it was hard to see them – too fast and too far away. But, thank heavens for little kids! They are not programmed to see only what they have seen before like we adults. So the kids showed me two different woodpeckers, one pileated and two red-headed. Beautiful birds!

A guest walkingby stopped to ask me to identify a bird picture. Well, it was a very nice shot of a barred owl. We talked about their keen night vision, silent flight and why ambient light at night can be a problem. The kids thought their bedroom night light would be ok.



By now we arrived close to the Gator Pond, and another group of guests pointed out an alligator to the right of the boardwalk, close to the fallen tree's root ball. I've never seen one there before. This would prove to be the day's entertainment later. At about the same time the kids and I saw something right behind the alligator. There was an adult great blue heron! Likely 15 ft. from us, just standing there in the mottled shade, blending into the setting. That beautiful creature spent most of the day with me in awe.



Within a very few minutes the gator was gone, but we watched the water get stirred up. We could follow her and just knew she was right there (note: I recognized this alligator from last year and knew it was her). Yup, up popped her head, crunching a smallish fish, then down the hatch. What a show, not four feet away! Let's see Disney beat that! This event went on the entire day. We even had a black water snake visit for several hours.
