



President and Executive Director's Letter

Since our June newsletter we can report that the Boardwalk Expansion project is making good progress and captivating our attention. Much to our surprise, the crucial de-mucking phase of the parking site is quite a lengthy process. With a little bit of research one discovers that de-mucking was necessary to remove years of decomposed matter that created unstable soil. When the muck is removed it is replaced with a compactable fill sand material installed in 12 inches lifts and compacted between each lift. They dug out the muck and as expected the water came up and there is still a parade of trucks bringing in sand. They will be ready to start building the parking site pad when the fill sand is completely compacted.

A temporary bridge was installed to cross over the canal and pictures give us an indication of the future location of the Interpretive Pavilion. We could fill several

pages of the newsletter with the numerous pictures we've received, and we are happy to share quite a few with you of this historic event in the Preserve. Below, an aerial view from Jay Staton gives the big picture.

Construction Progress at the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk

Many of you are aware that construction of the Big Cypress Bend Boardwalk expansion was approved by Florida Dept. of Environmental Protection earlier this year, and construction has been underway since May.

The project is creating a "buzz" around Collier County, and on August 16th we were pleased to welcome Commissioner Rick Locastro, who represents District 1 in Collier County. The entire Fakahatchee property lies within District 1.


To explain the project and highlight developments to date, the Park Manager Allen

From there, we drove over to the construction area, where the on-site Project Manager walked us to the site of the pending bathroom and the new

bridge that will connect the parking lot to the new Interpretative Pavilion. We all gained an appreciation for the complexity of the work involved, and I better understood what an accomplishment this will be when the project comes in on time.

Overall, I believe the visit was collectively beneficial, and the Commissioner offered to assist in helping with the flow of communications between the Park, the construction team and Collier County, where appropriate.

As you can see from the pictures that follow, the work site is exactly that at present, but it is exciting to progress underway. I also appreciated that the wildlife is still abundant around the construction site, and I hope that this is a wonderful omen for the future.

On East Main trail near the historic cabin, alligators demonstrating aggressive behavior had to be removed by a licensed contractor paid by Fish And Wildlife Conservation. Such behavior indicates that they have been fed by visitors. Park staff installed a sign to remind visitors it is illegal to feed wildlife.
