


President and Executive Director Letter

Tiny seedlings that had been carefully attached with strings have established healthy root systems. The Friends of Fakahatchee continue to support the Orchid Restoration Project led by Park Biologist Mike Owen and **FWC Biologist Dennis** Giardina.
