

U-Haul Unveils Ghost Orchid SuperGraphic in the Preserve

Don't be surprised if you see a rare ghost orchid — normally found hanging around on a pop ash, pond apple orcypress tree in the Fakahatchee — trucking down the highway somewhere else in the country.

U-Haul International, Inc. has chosen the delicate epiphyte to represent the state of Florida in their new Super-Graphic program. Soon, 600 new U-Haul moving vans decorated with 10-foot-long stylized drawings of the ghost orchid and its habitat will be available for rental throughout the nation.

A prototype was unveiled outside the Fakahatchee Strand State Preserveoffice in Copeland, Sept. 8. On hand were U-Haul staff from Phoenix headquarters, Everglades City mayor Sammy Hamilton, Everglades Area Chamber of Commerce representative Claudia Davenport, Everglades City School third and fourth graders, DEP staff and Friends of

The most southern sloughs of Florida are the only places in North America where the ghost orchid is found. Owen says the highest concentration of the orchid is probably in the Fakahatchee Strand.

Friends of Fakahatchee Finish Active Year

The Friends of the Fakahatchee (FOF) citizen support organization had its busiest year ever.

During the June 1 to May 31 1999-2000 year, we increased membership, expanded our presence at the Preserve's office on Janes Scenic Drive, hosted a variety of events and began networking with other organizations.

FOF is getting the word out about the unique qualities of the Strand and its inhabitants. Our web site has been up and running since early summer. The newsletter - which keeps members up to date on our activities -- was also inaugurated last year.

We purchased a photo display system and installed it at the visitors center on Janes Scenic Drive. Visitors are now enticed into the Strand by exquisite pictures of orchids and landscapes.

FOF became affiliated with the Friends of Florida State Parks and four members represented FOF at the annual state CSO meeting in Tampa.

We co-hosted a barbecue in the Preserve with the Friends of the Panther Refuge as the culmination of a Florida panther poster contest for Collier County school children.

FOF also held the first annual Board of Directors' Retreat, an overnight camp-out hosted by board member Dennis Marlin, who has a private cabin in the Freserve.

Members put in a full day dismantling

a donated trailer for salvage. Aluminum and other recyclable materials were sold and monies added to the general fund.

We hosted several "Photo Safaris" with the help of board member and natural landscape photograher Jeff Rippie. One, geared for Florida journalists, generated a front page article in the outdoor section of the Palm Beach Post.

Two of the photography workshops were conducted by Ripple as fundraisers to support a grant application to the Florida Humanities Council for a photo exhibit.

Fakahatchee to Travel

A comprehensive photo exhibit featuring Spencer and Barbara Doty for postage for the natural and cultural history of the Fakahatchee Strand, photographed by artist and writer Jeff Ripple, will go on tour in Florida this winter.

The 15- to 20-piece show will open, Feb. Dr. John C. and Lisa M. Klemes Dental 5, 2001, at the University of Florida Museum of Natural History in Gainesville and close, July 2, 2001.

A local showing will be held at the Everglades City Museum, April 3 through the end of April. The Board will host a reception in conjunction with the show, details to be announced.

The Friends hope this exhibit helps residents and visitors better understand this unique environmental resource.
